NWD Commander's Corner

Now that I've had time to put all the unit's gear, as well as mine, back in its place, and have had time to think about our annual event at Fort Laurens last weekend, I can't help but feel pleased with the event. Although we didn't have the numbers of participants we would like, the quality of what we presented more than made up for any quantity deficit. I thought about myself as a spectator at the event, rather than as a participant and wondered at all there was to see and learn. In addition to our regular lecture/demonstrations of Music, Clothing, Small Arms, and Artillery, we also showed the public how a log structure could be built in full-scale, the intricacies of map making and other geographers' skills, 18th c. medicine, the building of a Native wikiup and field fortifications, as well as all the impromptu activities such as drill, camp life, and discussing the history of our various units. We also incorporated some of the site's history directly into the weekend's activities by staging an ambush, led by our few Natives, of a wood party. We also welcomed a friendly Delaware to the Congressional camp, and presented him with a small flag of red and white stripes. The Adjutant then read General Orders to the men describing correct behaviors with the Indians. All these scenarios were taken directly from the orderly books of the 8th Pennsylvania and Stephenson's Militia. I am sure that whatever special interest a member of the public had, we could address their questions, and that we provided more than a full day's engagement for the public attendees. I would like to thank all those NW Dept. members that attended, and would like to mention the participating units, which were;

There was so much going on during the event day that it was hard to find time to visit the two fine sutlers that attended the event, but both reported that the weekend had been worthwhile, and hope to attend again. It is worth noting that we had two field pieces demonstrate and take part in the actions during our TWDs. One was the light howitzer crewed by the RNLP, and the other a 3-pounder crewed by Jim Workman and members of the 8th Pa. After the regularly scheduled activities on Saturday, we held a brief memorial service to remember and honor Kurt Ayers, 4th NJV, Timpani's Coy., Wayne Neilsen, RNLP, and Willie (Delmar) Wilson with salutes of musketry and artillery, and remembrances of friends.

It is also worth noting that our annual General Membership Meeting was held, but that due to restrictions on being in the museum Saturday evening, we held our meeting on Sunday morning, prior

to our church service. The most important part of the meeting was the announcement of our election, but I'll let you read about this in the Adjutant's notes. I would, however like to thank Cheryl Weidner, John Conklin, and Bernie Borowski for their service as Board Members at Large. Being on the NW Dept. Board requires a commitment of time and effort, and all three have performed well during their terms.

I would like to thank Tom Pieper, 23rd R.W.F., for coordinating the event for not only this year but for as long as I can remember. His hard work before and during the event help make this an outstanding weekend year after year. I want to thank Alan Kraus and Mike Ripley, R.N.L.P., for doing the work to prepare and haul full-sized logs to the site, demonstrate their use, then load them back up. (These logs were large enough that a special front end-style machine was needed). Thanks to all those that stepped outside their regular impressions to help interpret.

I would be remiss if I did not make mention of the fine weekend we had at Fort Niagara, 3-4 June 2017. Again, our numbers were not what I had hoped for, but the enthusiasm and spirit of those NW Dept. members participating made for a great weekend. On the Congressional side, we formed a single company based on the 8th Pennsylvania, with members of the Ill. Regt., Kellar's Coy., Delaware Regt., Crockett's Western Bttn., and the 5th Va. Regt. We also were supported by the howitzer manned by the Naval Landing Party. I believe NW Dept. Crown participation was minimal, with only our Jagers involved. We had two very spirited tacticals on Saturday, and the Continentals were able to take some of the fort's outer works, but were not successful in storming the main gate. On Sunday, weather caused the cancelation of the first tactical, and in the afternoon the Continentals attacked both gates on the river side of the fort, forcing one and finally taking the fort by weight of numbers. The Congressional camp was in a new spot this year, being too large for the area outside the fort's ravelin. This year we camped east of the visitors' parking, and had plenty of room for four company streets, cooking areas, and officers' marquees. We received from the fort staff coffee and donuts each morning, along with lunches both days. Saturday evening, we were left on our own to prepare our meal, and the fellowship this facilitates is one of the things I really enjoy about what we do. It appears this is going to be an every-other-year event, and I had such a fine time I'm already looking forward to the next one. I must say, that often I am involved in commanding larger formations, not really getting to be with my unit and the rest of the NW Dept. folks, and I REALLY enjoyed being in ranks, seeing the action with the rest of the NW Dept. men. Thanks to Don O'Connell, King's 8th Regt. for making the initial arrangements, and to Dave Miller, 5th Va. Regt. for handling the NW Dept. Registration.

I want to take a few lines to recommend a book I read recently. **Braddock's Defeat**, by David Preston, is about the Battle of the Monongahela and the Road to Revolution. It was published by the Oxford University Press in 2015. Mr. Preston looks at Braddock's campaign from a new, Indian and French perspective, with some very interesting and surprising ideas. The book is very well written, and each page you read makes you want to read the next. Many men involved in the Braddock campaign would go on to be very active and important in the Revolution. I learned a great deal reading this book, and I am sure you will, too. Bruce Egli, Westmorland County Militia and Past NW Dept. Commander also has read and highly recommends this book.

In closing, I want to ask you to attend our upcoming event at Fort Meigs, Perrysville, Ohio, 19-20 August. This is a joint event with our sister organization, the **NorthWest Territorial Alliance**, and it is hoped that we can grow this event to become sort of a grand encampment of the Midwest. The Fort Meigs site is outstanding and easy to get to, being right off the Ohio Turnpike and I 75. This year the fort staff is providing an evening meal for us, and there is plenty of room for any activity you can imagine. There is a fine museum on the site, along with exhibits in nearly all the fort's many blockhouses. The way to help grow this event is for you to attend. All our NW Dept. units are needed, and I hope every NW Dept. member will take the challenge to help be part of the NW Dept. leadership by actually attending events and getting you unit members, along with NW Dept. members from other units, to attend as well. You can help by leading from the front. If you know of an NW Dept. member that lives near you and is not a member of your unit, ask them to go to the event with you. The NW Dept. has more than 300 households, with many of those containing multiple NW Dept. members. It would be amazing to see 300 NW Dept. members at an event, but I'm a realist. I do believe that we should very easily be able to field 100 NW Dept. members without difficulty, if **YOU** want it to happen. Wouldn't **YOU** like to fall in with a big formation of your NW Dept. friends and unit members?

It must have been summer of 2004- Philip was eleven. We had been to Gettysburg the year before and Phil was hungry for more living history. By chance, I had stumbled upon an advert for Ft. Laurens – and it was in Ohio! (Yay!) As we walked around the grounds, I could barely keep up with my son. He talked to absolutely everyone he saw in period dress- especially in the British encampment. (I believe he took the King's schilling from Doug) After a while, he looked at me and said: "Mommy, I want to do this and I want to look like them!". It was, of course, the NJV he was referring to, and this began our friendship with Kurt Ayers and the fine people of the BAR. Kurt wasn't there that summer- one of the few encampments he missed- but the other NJV guys put us in touch via email, as Kurt was closer to our locale, to mentor us through the process of becoming 18th century citizens. Next summer, we were again at Laurens, but this time as participants. Kurt arranged some loaner clothes- NJV hand-me downs for Phil; a short gown of Cindy's for me. He shared with us his camp supplies- we had none; introduced Phil to the musicians, me to the Ladies and steered me in the right direction to find patterns and supplies to make our own kit. Over the winter, he helped talk me through the making of Phil's first regimental. Our first year at Ft. Henry, where Phil was allowed to carry a musket. Kurt loaned him his. After the tactical, with a gentle (but firm) smile, Kurt made sure Phil knew how to clean it, as well! Kurt became our go-to guy: he taught Phil to pitch a tent, was our car-pool buddy for longer trips (to Ligonier and Ft. George), gently correcting me when I went wrong with garments (one notable occasion when I made Phil some trousers that were the wrong color)- after having a good chuckle with Rich Stoll first! Most of you knew Kurt for much longer than I, and I'm sure you have many stories to share. I don't seem to have a single story- what I remember most are these little things. Always kind and generous; his easy way with interacting with the public; his willingness to share his knowledge and expertise; his gift of listening, whatever the topic; looking after my boy, when I did not want to camp (which was always) and Phil did. Since that first summer, I have to give partial parenting credit to the BAR, for although David and I had most of the year, weekends in the summer it was all of you. Kurt was- and is- for me the "face" of the BAR. His willingness to guide and teach welcomed us into this fascinating 18th century world and gave Philip childhood experiences I never could have. I thank you all for that- and especially Kurt Ayers- an extraordinary gentleman and an extraordinary friend.

The 13th Virginia Regiment was inspected during the event. The result of the inspection was that a recommendation was sent to the Main Department requesting that the 13th Virginia Regiment be moved from Applicant Unit to Full Member Unit status. Please offer your congratulations when you see them.

As always, the meals provided by the volunteer staff of Fort Randolph were excellent.

While it remains to be seen whether or not the Siege of Fort Randolph will be on the NWD schedule in 2018 you are welcome to participate as an individual at any of the Fort's scheduled events. After Action Report Ft. Niagara

On June 3-4 the NWD returned to Ft. Niagara for Redcoats and Rebels. On Saturday the weather was perfect for a re-enactment. Temperatures were in the mid 70's, a slight breeze and the sky was blue. The evenings were comfortable for sleeping. However Sunday morning brought rain, and many of the troops left for home.

The fort has a new Visitor Center that helps explain the history of the area and it being under three flags. Because it was home to forces including American and British, this is truly hallowed ground. Sutlers inside the fort included William Booth Draper and others.

Military camps were laid out in the proper formation. Kitchens were set to the side because of the shape of the field. First formation required the officers to stay in the Commander's Marquee until the company sergeants had sized and formed their companies. Then the officers were ordered to take charge.

The turnout from the Northwest Department was disappointing. We fielded roughly 25 men at arms and a crew for the Howitzer. Three ladies from the department were present and helped man the adjutant's tent where visitors would take a loyalty oath to Congress and the United States.

The battles were scripted with the Americans driving the British back into the fort. Two scenarios called for the Americans to try to gain entry to the fort, but it was not until the last scenario that entrance was gained because many of the British troops had left for home.

Over all, a good time was had by everyone. The Fort now plans to put Rebels and Redcoats on an every other year basis, so we will not return till 2019. Niagara is a good jumping off place for a tour of upstate New York. There are many interesting things to see and do.

Nathaniel Greene, Quartermaster General of the Continental Army. I can't say that it made me feel any better about what is surely my own absentmindedness, but it certainly puts me in good company.

From George Washington to Major General Nathanael Greene, 7 October 1779

To Major General Nathanael Greene

[West Point] Octr 7th 1779

Dear Sir

I have lost—& cannot tell how—an old & favourite penknife & am much distressed for want of one—if you have any in your stores please to send me one—if you have not, be so good as to get one immediately. perhaps Mr Bayley could furnish me. one with two blades I should prefer, where choice can be had. I am Dr Sir Yr Most Obedt

The 2017-2019 NWD Elections are complete. Election Committee Members Tom Pieper, Tom Hornbrook and I met at the Fort Laurens Event 8 July 2017 to tabulate the Election ballots. The Executive Board consisting of Commander Bob Cairns, Deputy Commander Dave Miller, Inspector Joe Forte, Adjutant Bob Kashary and Paymaster Bill Dibbern ran unopposed and were thus re-elected. Kidnap the Prince!

Prince William Henry (later King William IV), born in 1765, was the third son of King George III. William joined the Royal Navy as a Midshipman when he was 13. The young prince can be seen, with his younger brother Edward, in a 1778 portrait by Benjamin West.

With Midshipman Prince Edward aboard, HMS *Prince George* sailed into British – occupied New York in September 1781. This caused social excitement, as he was the first member of the royal family to visit America. He was, however, kept quietly aboard ship or in quarters in Hanover Square. Col. Matthias Ogden, a Continental Army officer held captive in New York, was released by exchange about the time of the Prince's arrival. Ogden noticed that many of the officer's quarters were lightly guarded, and conceived of a scheme to seize the Prince and Admiral Digby, which he communicated to General Washington upon his release. This would signally improve the American position at the peace negotiations. Washington wrote with his approval:

Sir,

The spirit of enterprise so conspicuous in your plan for surprising in their quarters, & bringing off the Prince-William Henry and Admiral Digby, merits applause; and you have my authority to make the attempt in any manner, & at such a time as your own judgement shall direct.

I am fully perswaded, that it is unnecessary to caution you against offering insult or indignity to the persons of the Prince, or Admiral should you be so fortunate as to capture them; but it may not be amiss to press the propriety of a proper line of conduct upon the party you command.

In case of success, you will, as soon as you get them to a place of safety, treat them with all possible respect, but you are to delay no time in conveying them to Congress, & reporting your proceedings with a copy of these orders.

Given at Morristown this 28th day of March 1782.

Go: Washington

Note Take care not to touch upon the ground wch is agreed to be Neutral – viz from Rahway to Newark & four miles back.

(Note that we don't notify Congress until after the affair. GW knew how to keep secrets.)

Col. Ogden drew up a detailed plan for an amphibious raid, but General Clinton, the British commander, suspected a plot was afoot, and greatly increased the number of guards. Ogden's plan was never tried.

Sitting in the House of Lords as Duke of Clarence, Prince William opposed the abolition of slavery, arguing that living standards in the Scottish Highlands were worse. He ascended to the British throne in 1830 as King William IV. William was generally popular with the British public, especially after long reign of the dissolute and spendthrift George the IV as Prince Regent and then King. He assisted the liberal Whig government in passing the Reform Act of 1832, abolishing ancient "rotten boroughs" and rebalancing seats in the House of Commons to better reflect actual population. These reforms were bitterly opposed in the then still powerful House of Lords. At one point, William was forced to dash to the Lords, put on his crown, and dissolve Parliament to prevent defeat of the Bill. Creating a number of new Peers, and threatening to create more, William "persuaded" the Lords to pass the Reform Bill.

William IV died in 1837, stubbornly hanging on until his niece Victoria was old enough to take the throne without a regency.
